

Delivering Alcohol The Right Way

Delivering alcohol makes you eligible for more offers and helps you earn extra tips on the SkipTheDishes Network.

The first step to start delivering alcohol is to confirm if you need to get certified. Each province has different rules and regulations regarding alcohol delivery and certification.

Here's a cheat sheet with some basic legal requirements for alcohol delivery:

British Columbia

- You must be 19 years of age or older.
- You must have a valid Serving It Right Certification.
- When picking up an alcohol order, you should bring your government-issued photo ID and [Serving It Right Certification](#).
- You are legally required to check the customer's government-issued ID. **The name on the customer's ID must match the name on the order.**
- Alcohol orders can only be delivered to residential addresses, and can never be released to customers at schools, prisons, remand centres, or businesses that also sell alcohol.
- It is illegal to deliver alcohol to a person that is visibly intoxicated or under the age of 19.
- Two ID's need to be verified before delivering alcohol. The primary ID should be an official government-issued ID (including foreign government-issued) with name, picture and birth date; such as a driver's licence or passport.
- The secondary ID could include the name and signature or picture; such as a credit card or student ID.
- By law, you must return undelivered alcohol to the vendor immediately.
